The 68<sup>th</sup> Ave NE Sidewalk Improvement Project improved safety and access for pedestrians by installing approximately 400' of new sidewalk on an arterial near downtown Kenmore, adjacent to a busy auction house, apartment buildings and mobile home parks.

The right of way acquisition stage of the SR 522 West A Project took place during this reporting period. New sidewalks, ADA ramps, lighting and landscape buffers will be added where there are currently minimal or no pedestrian facilities. The project area is SR 522 (NE Bothell Way) from 61<sup>st</sup> Ave NE to 65<sup>th</sup> Ave NE and right of way negotiations were performed on over 30 parcels.
