4. Next, I will tell you about a measure that could appear on a future ballot in Kenmore and that could serve as a possible funding source for parks and recreation in the City, including a future public park at Lakepointe.

This measure would authorize the creation of a Metropolitan Parks District which would be contiguous with Kenmore's city boundaries. This district would have authority to increase property taxes to pay for a new park and shoreline habitat restoration at Lakepointe, as well as for other recreation and park maintenance in the City, thereby offsetting the City's existing parks and recreation costs. The parks district would be governed by the Kenmore City Council serving as the Board of the Kenmore Metropolitan Parks District and would have the authority to levy up to 75 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value. Of that 75 cents, the City would levy 46 cents, which would cost the owner of an average home in Kenmore about \$38 per month, or \$456 a year.
